## *Background*

The Draft 2050 Regional Transportation Plan sets forth a comprehensive vision to guide transportation investments and policy decisions in the San Benito region over the next 25 years. Prepared by SBCOG in collaboration with local, state, and regional partners, the plan is designed to support economic growth, environmental quality, and community livability through a well-connected, multimodal transportation system. Updated every four years to reflect changing conditions and needs, the Regional Transportation Plan aligns regional priorities with state, and federal goals while addressing infrastructure, mobility, and accessibility for residents, businesses, and visitors.
